MINUTES OF A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF TARRANT COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NUMBER ONE HELD ON THE 24TH DAY OF JUNE, 1981 AT 9:00 A. M.

The call of the roll disclosed the presence or absence of Directors as follows:

Also present were Messrs. Bill Hilliard, Manager-Land Department of the District and Ben Hickey, General Manager of the District.

Director Newton acted in his capacity as President and Director Alexander acted in his capacity as Secretary, whereupon proceedings were had and done as follows:

1.

On motion duly made and seconded, and with assurance from management that all requirements of law relating to the "open meeting" law had been met, the minutes of the meeting held May 27, 1981 were read and approved by the Directors and it was accordingly ordered that such minutes be placed in the permanent files of the District.

2.

Mr. Ben Hickey, General Manager of the District requested authority for the District to enter into Contract for the purchase of the following described tracts of land required for Program E - Richland Creek Project, on the following basis

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for payment, to wit:

- (a) Tract No. 78 10.29 acres in fee @ \$600.00 per acre from Mrs. Vella V. Blackmon, Mrs. Clara M. Boyd, Mrs. Alpha Boyd Johnson, Mrs. Annie Boyd Baker, Mr. James Hershal Boyd, Mr. Robert Vernon Boyd and Mrs. Carolyn A. (Boyd) Williams, Navarro County, Texas - Richland Project.
- (b) Tract No. 102 1,041 acres in fee @ \$640.00 per acre from Carolyn Taylor, Bessie Montgomery, Jerry Daniel Montgomery, Margaret M. Thomas, Leona Montgomery and Mary Danlin Robinson, Navarro County, Texas - Richland Project.
- (c) Tract No. 74 approximately 585 acres in fee @ \$630.00 per acre from Mona A. Walker, Kathryn A. Mumberson and Joe E. Anderson, Navarro County, Texas - Richland Project.
- (d) 423,481.6 square feet in fee @ \$0.65 per square foot from Mansfield State Bank, Tarrant County, Texas - Richland Project.
- (e) 51,636.1 square feet in fee @ \$0.85 per square foot from Larry G. Wood, Trustee, Tarrant County, Texas -Richland Project.

Following a detailed presentation of the tracts, and upon recommendation of Management of the District, Director Thornton moved, seconded by Director Alexander, that the District be now authorized to enter into contract for the purchase of the above described tracts and on the basis as shown; upon a vote taken all Directors voted approval for Tract No. 78, 102 and 74 as above listed; and approval of the Tracts (d) and (e) as above listed with Directors Geren and King abstaining.

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Management stated that in addition to the high bid proposals of \$15,221.38 for the above listed equipment the District had collected \$7,264.85 as hail damage to the vehicles from the insurance company covering same; making a total of \$24,486.23 to be realized by District's sale. Whereon Director Alexander moved, seconded by Director Geren and unanimously approved, that upon the recommendation of management of the District the bid proposals as herein listed be accepted.

4.

Management of the District presents the following recommendation, to wit:

WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM - "WATERBOARD SUBDIVISION" CEDAR CREEK

The District presently owns and operates a water and sewer system in the Waterboard Subdivision at Cedar Creek Lake. These systems were originally installed as an example of what should be done to (1) provide proper service and (2) protect the water quality of the lake. The two systems have served as a model for other developments around the lake since 1971.

The District has operated and maintained the water and sewer system with District personnel and equipment since its installation in 1971. Recently, we were approached by the City of Trinidad which expressed an interest in purchasing the water system in order to service an area which it recently annexed into its boundaries.

In the course of negotiations the District insisted that, if a sale were to be made, it must include the sewer system as well as the water system inorder to relieve us of all operational responsibility. The City has agreed to purchase and operate both systems. The proposed terms of the sale are:

- (1) Purchase price of \$65,000.00;
- (2) The City will pay the District for the System over a 15 year period at an interest rate of 8%. This interest rate was derived based on the estimated rate that tax exempt municipal financing would require to acquire the system;

- (3) The District will retain the land upon which the two systems are located and lease it to the City with the stipulation that it will revert to the District if it is abandoned;
- (4) Owners of lots who have heretofore paid a tap fee to the District but have not actually connected to the system will not be required to pay another fee.

The sale of the water and sewer system is advantageous to the District for several reasons:

- It frees operating personnel for other duties;
- (2) It frees equipment of the District for more utilization elsewhere;
- (3) It will broaden the customer base for rate setting purposes;
- (4) It gets the District out of the "retail" water treatment business that is losing money.

Following a thorough discussion, Director Geren moved, seconded by Director Alexander and unanimously approved, that the recommended sale as herein proposed for the water and sewage systems to the City of Trinidad, Texas be accepted.
