Those delegation members were Messrs. Craig Lonon, City Manager of Corsicana; Rex Carpenter, Executive Vice President Corsicana Chamber of Commerce; Oliver Albritton and Tom White of the Chamber's Industrial Development Team. (a) Following remarks made by Directors and discussion, Mr.

Thornton asked Mr. Bill Hilliard to read the resolution to be

considered to wit:

RESOLUTION OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS

WHEREAS, BY LETTER DATED March 21, 1985, the City of Corsicana presented to Tarrant County Water Control and Improvement District Number One a proposal for settlement in mitigation of the impact of Richland Creek Reservoir on said City; and

WHEREAS, said District desires to achieve a settlement with the City of Corsicana;

IT IS, THEREFORE, RESOLVED that Tarrant County Water Control and Improvment District Number One (District) make the following settlement offer to the City of Corsicana (City):

- That the District recognizes the City's senior rights to 13,650 acre feet of water per annum from Richland Creek Reservoir;
- 2. That under the terms of its existing standard water supply contract, the District will obligate itself to sell to the City any additional volume of water at any time in the future; the City, however, will not be required to abide by the "take or pay" provisions of said Contract until January 1, 2003; a copy of the proposed Contract between the District and the City is attached to this Resolution as Exhibit A;
- 3. That the District will pay to the City the sum of \$2,107,000.00 for easements over the City's property lying at or below 320 feet m.s.l.; and for liquidation of damages to the City's facilities at Lake Corsicana;
- 4. That the District will remove the Lake Corsicana Dam; will evenly distribute the material from the dam on the City's property above elevation 315 m.s.l.; and will excavate a boat channel from Chambers Creek to the City's property, said channel to be sufficiently deep at normal conservation level to accommodate recreational boats customarily found on inland lakes;
- 5. That in addition to the foregoing proposal for mitigation of the impact of said reservoir upon the City, the District will reimburse the City the sum of \$1,200,000.00 for improvements to the City's waste treatment plant, which reimbursement will be made periodically as work progresses, and based upon actual cost to said City; said improvements will bring waste treatment plant into compliance with state and federal standards as to effluent discharge when said reservoir is in place;
- 6. That the District will dismiss its Application for Writ of Error, currently pending; that the District and the City will file a joint motion in the District Court of Navarro County, Texas, 13th Judicial District, seeking the dissolution of the injunction entered in Cause No. 533-83, styled The City of Corsicana vs. Tarrant County Water Control and Improvement District Number One; and further seeking the dismissal, with prejudice, of said lawsuit; all costs of Court and attorney's fees to be paid by the party by which incurred.

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ADOPTED by the Board of Directors of Tarrant County Water Control and Improvement District Number One on March 29, 1985.

Following the reading of the resolution and discussion, the General Manager recommended adoption. Director Newton moved to adopt the resolution as presented and Director King seconded the motion. The measure was unanimously approved and the Directors instructed staff to prepare an agreement for final settlement of the matter.

(b) Mr. Hilliard next presented the matter of settlement of rights-of-way and bridge conflicts at the Richland Creek Project with Navarro County. The total amount of consideration is to be reunified in a lump sum payment as originally proposed. The total amount of consideration for the liquidation of all claims of the County arising from the construction of the reservoir is \$6,394,000. Staff recommended approval of this sum. Director King moved to approve the settlement in the amount of \$6,394,000 for damages as submitted. Director Newton seconded the motion and with the approval of all Directors present it was so ordered.

Mr. Hilliard presented an agreement for consideration and approval between the District and Texas Power and Light Company for adjustment at the Richland Creek Project. The described project is the Navarro - Streetman (Superock) 69KV Line Relocation. The estimated cost for adjustments of the transmission facilities is \$810,000. This is one of the ongoing adjustments to be administered by the owner/utility itself with reimbursement by the District. The General Manager recommended the expenditure of \$810,000 as proposed for this relocation. Director King moved approval as submitted. Director Newton seconded the motion and with the approval of all Directors present it was so ordered.
