Reference here is made to said exhibit as part hereof. Upon consideration of this matter, Director Hogsett made a motion that said proposed contract do be approved, ratified and confirmed as the act and deed of the District, and that the saie Rube Williams hereby do be established as Tax Assessor for the District for the year 1933. Adoption of this motion was seconded by Director Stripling. Upon a vote being taken the motion was carried and it was so ordered.

Attached to these Minutes in folio as "Exhibit B," are reports of Messrs Pitner & Adams, as Auditors for the District, and dated as follows:

October 24, 1932, covering month of September and the year to date; November 19, 1932, covering month of October and the year to date; December 16, 1932, covering month of November and the year to date.

Reference here is made to said reports as a part hereof. Each of the Directors had been furnished a copy of each of said reports at the time the same were issued. It was the sense of the Directors that said reports did not at this time require any action and they were ordered received and filed.

Attached to these Minutes as "Exhibit C," here referred to as part hereof is an opinion of the Attorneys for the District, concerning the demands of McKenzie Construction and Uvalde Construction Companies, and relating to their desire that the District promptly sell bonds in order to enable the District to settle with said contractors, even though the District might not actually realize from the bonds as much as 90% on the dollar of par of the bonds. The opinion having been read, it was ordered received and filed. The Directors were of the opinion that they should not accede to the demand of said contractors.

Attached to these Minutes as "Exhibit D," is a statement of the financial condition of the District as of this date. Reference here is made thereto as part hereof. Said statement shows proposed voucher checks No. 3058 to 3083, both inclusive, for the total sum \$3846.98. There was full consideration of the data to support the proposed voucher checks, whereupon Director Hogsett made a motion that the claims evidenced by said checks be approved as due and payable, and that said proposed checks do be executed and delivered to the respective persons entitled to receive the same. Adoption of this motion was seconded by Director Stripling. Upon a vote being taken the motion was carried and it was so ordered.



Attached to these Minutes as "Exhibit E," and here referred to as part hereof, is one of the several multiple reciprocal receipts showing that the Continental National Bank of Fort Worth, has delivered to Director Bewley, as Custodian of the District's pledges to secure deposits, United States Treasury notes of aggregate par value \$80,000.00, which are specifically described in said reciprocal receipt. There was full consideration of this matter.

Director Bewley recommended that the security received by him do be ratified as good and sufficient security, whereupon Director Hogsett made a motion that said security hereby do be ratified and approved as good and sufficient security, that the same be held in pledge under the appropriate contract, that one of said receipts be attached to these Minutes as an exhibit and that the other do be attached to the depository bond as "Exhibit No. 43," as is provided for in said bond. Adoption of this motion was seconded by Director Stripling. Upon a vote being taken the motion was carried and it was so ordered.

- (a) You are to do all things required by law to result that, property, both real and personal, subject to this District's tax for the year 1933 will be assessed, embodied in the roll (for the State and County) to be submitted to the Commissioners' Court for equalization: and. as equalized, ultimately pass to the Tax Collector as the basis for the collection of these taxes.
- (b) As soon as the approximate assessed values are known. this District will certify to you its tax rate for said year, in such manner as to prevent avoidable delay in the completion of your rolls.
- (c) For the rendition of the service above specified this District shall, on or before December 15, 1933, pay as compensation the sum SEVENTEEN HUNDRED FIFTY (\$1750.00) DOLLARS.

This letter is written in duplicate: Each of the duplicates has been executed in behalf of this District. You will please execute each duplicate and return one to the office of this District: Thereby your status as Tax Assessor for this District for the year 1933 will be established.

Estimate #22 on Eagle Mountain Dam includes as extra work an item of \$239.11 for making foundation tests which might be chargeable to the district engineers under their contract.

The minutes of January 19, 1931, request that arrangements be made with the district engineers regarding their fees on residue land purchased and damage claim settlements. We are advised that no definite understanding has been reached on these matters.

The matter of settlement with Tarrant County on highway matters is still pending.

Balance of \$100.00 on 1931 land rental due from J. I. Burgess has not been received as requested in the minutes of February 10, 1932.

On July 7, 1931 check #2552 for \$509.89 was issued to Will Laird for balance on 179.87 acres of land in fee and 49.14 acres easement. This check has not been paid and is on hand in your office, due to faulty title on several acres of this land, although you have a recorded deed to the property. It seems that he is making no progress toward getting the matter closed up.

As requested we have examined the audit report made by the County Auditor on tax collections for the year 1930 and find the district received the amount collected. However, the report shows that the Tax Collector is due the district \$114.43 for errors as listed on page 12 of the report.

Contractors estimate #28 approved June 9, 1932 included \$498.99 for extra work performed in August 1931. Approval of this item was withheld pending an explanation of it by the district engineers.

As per your request, we have verified the 1081 cancelled bond coupons, number 2, clipped from the unsold series D bonds dated November 16, 1931, coupons being due September 15, 1932 in the amount of \$25.00 each.

Gentlemen:

We submit herewith the monthly audited statement of Cash Receipts and Disbursements for the month of November and the year to date.

As requested in the minutes we report the following unfinished business:

The matter of establishing flood monuments and history was postponed indefinitely July 10, 1931.

The minutes of May 4, 1931 request the opinion of attorneys as to the liability of the district engineers for payment of \$186.08 for making test pits on Berkshire levee, which was included by the contractors in extra work.

Final estimate #32 on Eagle Mountain Dam includes as extra work items for making test holes etc amounting to \$1,640.63, which may be chargeable to the district engineers under their contract.

The minutes of January 19, 1931 request that arrangements be made with the district engineers regarding their fees on residue land purchased and damage claim settlements. We are advised that no definite understanding has been reached on these matters.

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Contractors estimate #28 approved June 9, 1932 included \$498.99 for extra work performed in August 1931. Approval of this item was withheld pending an explanation of it by the district engineers.

Dear Mr. Bennett:

We have before us letter of January 6, 1933, dated at San Antonio, Texas, addressed to you by McKenzie Construction Co., in which several questions are raised concerning the duty of the District to sell sufficient amount of its bonds to pay the balance now owing to the contractors.

There is, as a matter of course, a wide disparity between an expedient contract of sale and one that is illegal. In making sale of its bonds, sound public policy would require not only a sale legal and valid in its nature, but one that would not offend intelligent public opinion. This is but another way of declaring that this Board, in performing its functions as a public body, accountable to the tax-payers, should have as much regard for the spirit as for the letter of the law. Keeping merely within the technical letter of the law is not always a sign of discretion nor is it a full response to the ethics of a public trust.

It is true that the statute permits a sale of bonds at a minimum of ninety cents on the dollar and such a sale would be technically legal; but, on the other hand, would such a sale represent the exercise of a high sense of discretion when by waiting for a time for a rise in the market; the bonds could be sold to a better advantage.

In this connection it is proper to say that no court would undertake to substitute its discretion for yours, particularly where yours was honestly exercised, you having in mind the best interests of the District. The fact that you are permitted to sell the bonds at the minimum rate does not argue that you are obliged to do so, or that you are under any moral coercion to take this course. In

truth, it is intended under the statute as a last resort which should be sparingly invoked and then only to avert something in the nature of an emergency.

The District is one of limited power in the construction and completion of the enterprise which it set out to accomplish. In no other way was it authorized to discharge the obligation of the contract than by the issuance and sale of its bonds. In the sale of its bonds it lay under the duty to sell them, if possible, at par, and avert the sacrifice of selling an obligation of 100 cents at less than its face value, and paying interest on the full amount nominated in the bond.

When the District offers its bonds to the contractor, in exchange for work and material, at ninety cents on the dollar, it has treated the contractor with consideration and justice, and has measured its treatment by a criterion alike fair and legal.

Let us assume that the District may elect to sell the bonds at 90 and pay a brokerage thereon of say 3%. Is it not then, in effect, selling the bonds at less than 90 and is not the impression on the public mind practically the same as if the District had sold the bonds at 87 without a brokerage fee.

When you are advised, as in the case of the McKenzie letter, that the bonds cannot be sold on the market for more than 86 or 87, a bid for 90 with a commission of three per cent is obviously intended as a device to bridge the different between the amount of the bid and the market value. An indirection of that kind would be transparent to any court and would invalve an evasion of the statute.

It should also be remembered that a commission for sale of bonds would have to be fair and reasonable and the Board itself, would be held to know the state of the market. It could not bury its head in the sand like an ostrich, and claim that it did not perceive the trend of the market price.

#3 - Mr Bennett

The law regards the substance and not the form of the transaction, and since we live in the world we should not be allowed to plead ignorance of its conditions.
